So, as we look toward a "new" phase in Cheyenne Mountain's history, we must all continue to work hard to earn and keep those





#### **Board Bio: Dr. Glen Scott**



Board President Dr. Glen Scott was a founding member of the Friends of Cheyenne Mountain State Park and served as it's first President beginning in 2001. Since then he has served as Vice President and as a General Board Member. Glen is a retired Army Officer, now working as a Vice President for TechWise (a local defense contracting firm in Colorado Springs).

Glen and Barb (his "better half" and also a current Board member, serving as Treasurer) first came to Colorado Springs in 1999 when he was assigned as the Chief of Staff at Fort Carson. They quickly determined that Colorado Springs would be their permanent home...and sought to get involved in meaningful ways to contribute to the community. This desire to be a "community trustee," combined with their love of the outdoors (camping, hiking, etc) found a great opportunity for expression when the new State Park started holding public information meetings in late 2001. Glen decided that helping the Park become a world-class recreation, education, and environmental resource for Colorado in general, and for the Front Range Community in particular, was a great way to make a difference. Since that time Glen has been continuously involved with the Friends'

Group...and had the tremendous satisfaction of being involved in the growth of the Park from a dirt road and a set of blueprints to becoming the superb resource it is today.



#### 2009 Volunteer Banquet: Honoring the Best!

#### **Fourth Annual Volunteer Banquet Another Huge Success**

On Friday evening, December 4, the park staff, in conjunction with the Friends of CMSP, honored the park's hardworking volunteer crew. For the first time the event was held at Venue 515 in the Business of Arts Center in Manitou Springs. Ranger Brian Kerrigan, the volunteer coordinator at the park and the MC for the previous dinners, was unable to attend due to a stomach flu, but his wife Amanda and Senior Park Ranger Monique Mullis stepped in admirably to fill his shoes.

Before dinner, catered by local favorite, La Casita, Mullis spoke of the importance of the Volunteer contributions at the park. From a mere handful of volunteers in 2001, we now have 192 volunteers active. Their roles: naturalists, interpreters, trail hosts, trail maintenance, gardeners, camp hosts, Visitor Center hosts, Camper Services hosts and just about anything else that turns up at any given time.

Amazingly, the volunteers have almost doubled the hours contributed to the park over a four-year span. In 2006 they totaled 3937 hours; in 2009 that number jumped to 7,551.89 hours! Based on seasonal rates for the types of work accomplished, those hours, figured in wage equivalency, came out to: \$73,170.42. All volunteers were rewarded with a 2009 State Park Volunteer pin and a handy CMSP calendar. (Handy, that is, to keep track of all those hours!)



Though in no way making up for that \$73,000 figure, volunteers who contribute over 48 hours in a given year were then awarded Park Passes for 2010. Good at any state park, they are a nice reward for those who push the limits. This year forty volunteers earned passes. One of those was the recipient of the **Rookie of the Year Award** for 2009. **Susan Simmons** arrived on the scene this past spring, and hit the trail running. She showed tremendous dedication to the development of the Junior Ranger Program, as well as many interpretive programs, and quickly garnered 68.75 hours.



This year's 500 Hour Club Award went to an incredible volunteer, Janeen Igou. As Brian figures it, the 558 hours she claimed is at best a minimum. How does she contribute? It might be better to list what she doesn't do! Here is a partial list: Friends Board Member, coordinator of the year-round Raptor Monitoring Program, program presenter, front desk assistant, unofficial park photographer, and lugger of park supplies to local schools and events. And just because it needed to be done, she almost single-handedly ensured the success of this year's Volunteer Banquet!

Other awardees included Jim and Darlene Hatley, Camp Host Award; Susan Simmons, Lucy Bell, Mary Ann Hartman, Kris Baril, Janeen Igou, Pat Grove, and Natalie Wetzig, Junior Ranger Award; Debbie Barnes, Regal Raptor Award; Lee Tatum, Lucy Bell, and Pat Looney, Walking Stick Awards; Paul Smith, Jim Purdy and Jack Busher, McLeod Awards; Kathleen Cook, Guest Speaker Coordinator Award; Janeen Igou and Lori O'Hare, Banquet Planners Award; Pat Grove and Kris Baril, Seasonal Naturalist Award; and Jerry O'Hare, Friends of CMSP Award. Not to be forgotten, in a classic role-reversal, the Friends of CMSP and volunteers themselves presented **Brian Kerrigan** a gift for his hard work putting up with us over the past four years.

Finally, special thanks go out to the Friends of CMSP for their financial backing of this annual dinner.

### **Junior Ranger Program Takes Flight at CMSP**

Exciting news! The Park will start its Junior Ranger program for children this coming Spring, 2010! Naturalist Pat Grove took on the challenge of authoring and coordinating the Junior Ranger booklet for children from ages 7 to 12. Children will learn about the different ecosystems at the park, local plants, wildlife, safety, and much more. The 24 page booklet was beautifully illustrated by volunteer artist, Natalie Wetzig, who included many details in her drawings that make the booklet special to our park. The Friends of CMSP are grateful to Pat Grove, the Rangers, Volunteers and everyone who helped with this wonderful program. It will be enjoyed by children for years to come!

Children will learn about nature and stewardship as they work through the booklet, with the goal of achieving two levels. By completing the booklet, they reach the Badger level and will be awarded a Junior Ranger Badge and Certificate. Completing the booklet and attending a park program or participating in a park project helps them reach the second level of Puma. Junior Rangers reaching Puma status are awarded a badge and patch, as



well as the Junior Ranger Certificate. The program is available to all park Visitors and Educators. Due to printing costs, booklets are limited, but Educators can talk to Pat about making copies at their schools.

The Friends of Cheyenne Mountain are happy to fund this program, and many other important stewardship efforts at the park. Total funding for the Junior Ranger program so far is \$5185, but we anticipate great interest and will need to replenish the booklets, patches and badges as children participate. Our goal is for all children to have the opportunity to enjoy this program.
